EMB CALABARZON CONDUCTS TALK ON CLIMATE CHANGE IN CELEBRATION OF THE ENVIRONMENT MONTH

This year's World Environment Day was marked by campaigns to fight air pollution here in the country and around the world. As the UN and other governments highlighted that seven million people, including 600,000 children, die annually from causes related to poor air quality, the celebration of the Environmental Month is a means of showing that as individuals and as a group (organized group like teachers, student leaders, public servants, and private sectors) who are concerned with the environment and the future of its inhabitant, we can meet together as a collective power to ignite a change and become instruments to call for action and encourage a change in behavior and attitude towards battling and reducing air pollution. And so, as part of the month long celebration of EMB CALABARZON for the Environment Month 2019 with the theme "Beat Air Pollution" a the lecture on Resilience in the Changing Climate was held last June 20, 2019 at Kimberly Hotel Manila that was participated by principals and teachers from CALABARZON.

Climate Change was discussed as an encompassing topic related to all sorts of environmental problems including air pollution since this not at all detached from other environmental issues that we are facing. In fact, they are all intertwined. Like what Ms. Malixi – the resource speaker from PCAPI 4A – said, air pollution and poor solid waste management has been linked to climate change as climate change has also been linked to other environmental problems.
